On the Banks of the Wabash On the Banks of the Wabash, a portrait of the American explorer and soldier Christopher Henry McCarty, was made in 1811, and is one of five known likenesses of McCarty. This image depicts him in a relaxed and unconstrained pose, and was documented by the artist Samuel F. B. Morse. History Alonzo Chappelier, the brother of Edmund Pettus Chappelier, was born in Paris in 1777 and was a pupil of the French academic painter Jacques-Louis David. In 1804 Chappelier accompanied Napoleon to Algeria, and returned the following year. He is said to have decorated and chaperoned Napoleon throughout his campaigns and was one of his unofficial art advisors. Chappelier left Paris in 1810 and settled in St. Louis, Missouri. He began painting portraits in 1810 for which he received a commission from Colonel John W. Williams, a friend and business associate of his brother Edmund Pettus Chappelier, to do a portrait of Christopher Henry McCarty, the interpreter for the expedition of the DeKalb-Tombigbee Indians. Edmund Pettus Chappelier had helped fund Christopher Henry McCarty's translation of the Cherokee language to English. Samuel F. B. Morse was the engraver of the portrait as well as being the artist. He created a number of portraits for the Chappelier family and was possibly commissioned by Samuel B. Morse for the portrait of Christopher Henry McCarty in 1811. Although he continued to develop his career as an engraver, he never re-engraved the "On the Banks of the Wabash" portrait. The work is now owned by the Smithsonian American Art Museum.
